If this application is from a voluntary and community group, please briefly outline the group's structure, purpose and history	St Helens Residents Association formed in 2008 and is a registered RBKC Gold Star association. The Association acted as the 'qualifying body' for the STQW Neighbourhood Forum which was designated by the Council in 2013 and redesignated for a second five year term in 2018.			
	There are management committees for both bodies, elected annually, which now meet as a joint committee. Open meetings are held 3 or more times a year.			
	The StQW Neighbourhood Plan was successful at referendum in 2016 and adopted by RBKC as part of the Development Plan for the Borough in 2018. The purpose of the StQW Forum has been to improve quality of life and the economic, social			

and environmental characteristics of the
neighbourhood, via a neighbourhood plan and
encouragement of appropriate development in the
area.

B6. Project summary: (no more than 300 words)	Improving air quality in the neighbourhood has moved up the agenda of local residents in the 5 years since the StQW neighbourhood plan was prepared.			
	While air quality has been much improved since the start of lockdown, we do not wish to see a return to previous levels of pollution.			
	As we understand, there is an automatic monitoring station KC01 (part of the national AURN network) near St Charles Square. The RBKC Air Quality Annual Status Report for 2018 does not show any monitoring equipment at the heavily traffic congested location of the St Quintin 'triangle' and North Pole Road. Traffic at			

this location comes to standstill every weekday afternoon, with queues of buses, cars and HGVs.

Perceptions of local residents are that air quality is particularly bad at this location. We wish to explore with RBKC what could be achieved via a £10k NCIL budget in terms of improvements to air quality in the neighbourhood. This might be additional monitoring equipment to establish the extent of pollution.

We are also interested in the installation of a 'City Tree', 'moss wall' or similar CO2 filtering device, examples of which have been installed in Leytonstone, Oslo, Berlin and other cities. See at https://greencitysolutions.de/en/

We think that the small open space at the St Quintin Avenue/Highlever/North Pole Road/Barlby Road 'triangle' would be a suitable location for a CO2 filtering device. This could provide some public seating at a location where residents and employees working in the area use at lunch-time, sitting on the low walls that surround this RBKC maintained open space.



We understand the cost of such installations to be moe like £20k than £10k so would need to explore match funding if this option were pursued.

B7. Please explain how the project will benefit the wider community in the local area and/ or the borough Improving air quality in any part of the Borough has benefits or residents, workers and visitors to the area.

B8. Please explain how your project supports the development of the local area by addressing the demands that development places on the area	New development in the local area is relatively limited, but Latimer Road (off North Pole Road) is currently the subject of work by RBKC and StQW Forum to encourage redevelopment of light industrial units for mixed use with a target if 50-75 new housing units in the street. The RBKC New Homes scheme at 53 St Helens Gardens (recently consented) will have 8 units. Densification of this part of London is increasing as a result of decisions by OPDC and LBHF to grant planning consent to a series of residential towers in Scrubs Lane and Wood Lane. For all existing and incoming residents air quality is a major concern.
B9. What are the project costs and how much NCIL is being sought?	Of the £30k allocation for the StQW neighbourhood area, we are provisionally assigning £10 to this project with the remaining £20k assigned to our second proposal (CCTV in North Pole Road). This leaves aside the two separate allocations of £39k for each of Dalgarno and St Helens wards. We have not as yet sought match funding or crowdfunding.
B10. What are the proposed timescales for delivery of the project?	Depends on firming up of the project in discussion with RBKC.
B11. Who will deliver the project? Will your project look to involve local volunteers?	Henry Peterson, Char of the StQW Forum, will act as lead project manager.
